

How do you really understand what is in the Bible? Written over many centuries, by different people, and for different audiences, mostly in Greek and Hebrew, the Bible requires both careful reading and study to understand what is in there.

Of course, you could just pick up your Bible and start reading and hope to get out of it that you can based on what you think it says—in fact, which is the way that many people approach the Scriptures—but there is a better way.

Over the centuries saints, scholars, and students have devoted their lives to unraveling the scriptures. They have translated ancient languages, poured over ancient manuscripts, studied history, archeology, and anthropology. They have analyzed the text, argued over the meaning of individual words, compared differing sources, and reflected on the meaning of the text in their own lives and cultures.

Fortunately, because they have done all this, you do not have to. Of course, if you would like to enter the field of academic Biblical scholarship, you can. But if, like most people, you are reading your Bible for personal and spiritual enrichment, you do not have to speak Aramaic and study the history of ancient Babylon. What you need is a good Biblical commentary.

If you go to amazon.com and search for Bible Commentary, you will get a list of more than five thousand books. To start, look for commentaries from reputable publishers, or from church-related universities. The Collegeville series are small paperbacks for around \$5.00, but include the complete text, and a very readable introduction and analysis of the text. They even include questions for group discussion. I would be remiss if I did not recommend the Paulist Biblical Commentary, an exhaustive one-volume guide to the Bible with the most up-to-date scholarship. It is a significant investment, but well worth it. I think every Catholic home should have a copy!

The Bible is not a simple book and understanding what it says requires more than a cursory reading. The assistance of a decent commentary will go a long way toward enhancing your understanding and deepening your spirituality.
