For those not able to attend last Saturday's retreat, we focused our attention on the mission statement of the parish and where we are today. We also discussed our vision, as individuals and as a community, asking what lies ahead for the greater church and for our faith community. We were guided through the day by Sister Chris Partisano, CSJ, who provided the topics of discussion and gently kept us on focus. There were about 20 members of the parish in attendance, including Fr. Larry.

After each of us expressing who we were, where we see ourselves as members of this community and the role the community plays in our lives, we broke up into small discussion groups and reported back on topics such as our faith as individuals and as part of our parish community, the challenges we – as individuals and as a community - have faced in the past, those we face right now, and the challenges we expect to face in the future.

We concluded the day discussing what our parish offers us in the areas of Prayer and Worship, Leadership, Education and Service and our vision for these dimensions of our community in the future. We had an opportunity to listen, express our views, including our frustrations, our needs, and our hopes. Out of that discussion came insights and suggestions. Notes were taken and will eventually be shared with the entire community.

Topics were covered and insights expressed by others that I would never have considered on my own. For me, it was a community building experience. It gave me an opportunity to reflect on what the greater church and this faith community offer me, their strengths and their weaknesses and their place in my life.

I hope that this productive and meaningful dialogue can continue and that more members of the community can actively participate. Thank you, Sr. Chris, for all you did in putting together and facilitating this affirming program; we are so fortunate to have you as a member of this community.

Since the earliest days of human civilization, people have looked up at the skies at night, observing the motion of the stars and planets they saw there, and believed that the heavens -- meaning the physical home of the stars and beyond -- were where the gods dwelt. It is no accident that the planets of our solar system, with the exception of Earth itself, are named after ancient Greek and Roman gods.

Even with the spread of Christianity across the globe, humanity has still named objects in the skies for important religious figures. Since the year in 1919, the International Astronomical Union has governed the naming of celestial objects. The discoverers of new asteroids, comets, and moons are permitted to name the objects they find, which are also identified by number.

Today there are six minor planets or asteroids named for religious figures. 89 Julia is named for St. Julia of Corsica a fifth century martyr. 1840 Hus was named for a Czech religious reformer Jan Hus. 13th century saint Zdislava Berka lived an austere and generous life, founded a Dominican convent, and is commemorated in the name of the minor planet 5275 Zdislava. Lutheran theologians Martin Luther and Dietrich von Bonhoeffer also have minor planets named after them. Even Pope Benedict XVI has an asteroid named after him. 8661 Ratzinger was discovered on October 14, 1990 by Lutz D. Schmadel and Freimut Börngen of Tautenberg Germany. Although contemporary scientists don't often name the celestial objects they discover after deities, it's reassuring to note their occasional interest in placing saints and theologians in the heavens.
