
For many people-- from blushing school children to long-time spouses--Valentine's Day is a time to celebrate the notion of romantic love. And lots of people think that while they're exchanging cards, flowers, and chocolate, they're observing the vestiges of the feast day of a Catholic saint. The only problem is, it doesn't appear to be true.

"Valentine" was a popular name in the ancient world, and even in the old 1914 edition of the Catholic Encyclopedia, it was claimed that St. Valentine could have been one of at least three different people. When the Church revised its liturgical calendar in 1969, it deleted the feast days of saints whose history-- or existence-- was in doubt. So, along with the probably-mythical Veronica and Christopher, Valentine lost his feast day.

The story that St. Valentine's Day was created to supersede the Roman feast of Lupercalia of February 15th, was, according to contemporary scholars fabricated by 18th-Century English antiquarian Alban Butler, author of Butler's Lives of the Saints.

So where does the idea come from, that St. Valentine's Day is the time to celebrate romantic love? The idea can be traced back to England in the 14th century, particularly to the works of Geoffrey Chaucer, particularly his "Parliament of Foules."

So, where does that leave us? We have legends, fabrications, and fiction. Nevertheless, it must be said that the Church has nothing against romance. Indeed, the love that draws couples together is a wonderful gift from God, best tempered with the other virtues. And if hearts, flowers, and chocolate have become a traditional way to express love and affection, I say, "Bring'em on!"

Dr. Brian Flanagan — In Stumbling in Holiness, professor and theologian Brian P. Flanagan addresses the ways in which both holiness and sinfulness condition the life of the pilgrim church. His book is rooted in a liturgical-theological explanation of how the church prays through its continuing need for repentance and purification, as well as its belief in its present and future participation in the life of the Holy One. After reviewing some of the ways in which past theologians have tried to explain the coexistence of ecclesial holiness and sinfulness, Flanagan suggests that, even if we can have confidence that God will fully sanctify the church in the reign of God, our ecclesiology must always attend to both the sanctity we already experience in the church and the sinfulness that is part of our continuing journey toward that reign.
