One of the mysteries around Easter, is how the holiday got its English name. The most commonly cited account of why the feast of Christ's resurrection is called Easter comes from the seventh-century English monk, the Venerable Bede. In his book explaining calendars and the reckoning of time, de temporum ratione, Bede wrote that the month Eostremonat, now known as April, was named after the goddess Eostre. The problem is, there is virtually no other evidence of this goddess prior to Bede's writing.

In 1835, Jakob Grimm, of Grimm's Fairy Tales, published a collection of German myths and folk tales that mentions a goddess called Ostara, which he connects to the similar Eostre. It's from German Ostara festivals that we get the Osterhasen, or Easter bunny, and traditions involving eggs and sunrise services on hilltops.

But how does this connect to Easter, the feast of Christ's resurrection? Venerable Bede's other famous work, the Historia Ecclesiastica gentis Anglorum, or Ecclesiastical History of the English People, contains a letter from Pope Gregory I to St. Mellitus, a missionary sent to the heathen Anglo-Saxons of England. Pope Gregory encouraged Mellitus to use and adapt the pagan festivals, re-orienting them toward Christianity. Perhaps this is the reason that Easter is called Easter.

Some have suggested a connection between Easter and the Babylonian goddess Ishtar, but that's a difficult argument to make stick. The fact is, in nearly every other language in the world, Easter's name is derived from the Hebrew word Pesach. In Greek, Paskha, in Italian Pasqua, in Scots Gaelic An Casca. Even in English, the holiday wasn't called Easter until the 8th century.
