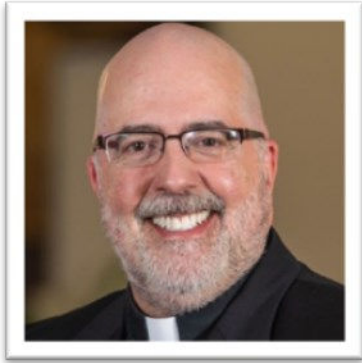

For thousands of years of human history, names have been regarded as sacred and powerful. To know a thing's true name was to have dominion over it. That's reflected in the creation story in Genesis 2, when God presents each of the animals to Adam, who gives each one a name. One of the ten commandments tells us not to take God's name in vain-- not to invoke God's name for some profane or unworthy purpose. In the Jewish tradition, it's forbidden to speak God's name at all. Many biblical stories include a change of name, reflecting a personal transformation. Abram becomes Abraham. Simon becomes Peter. Saul is renamed Paul.

When Catholics begin or end our prayer with the sign of the cross, the gesture is accompanied by the phrase, "In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit." Many of the collect prayers we pray at mass conclude with an invocation of the name of Jesus Christ.

When a child is born, one of the first questions parents are asked is the child's name. Our baptismal rite begins by asking parents what name they have given their child; that name is included in the act of baptism itself. When we are confirmed, we have the opportunity to take an additional name for ourselves, that reflects our growing understanding of who God calls us to be.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church (CC #2159) reminds us that the name we receive is ours for eternity. Every name is sacred and deserving of respect, both God's name, and our names. In an age when we are concerned about identity theft, and the security of our personal information, it's important to remember that our names are not just an asset to be guarded, but are an integral part of our relationship to God, who calls us each by name.
