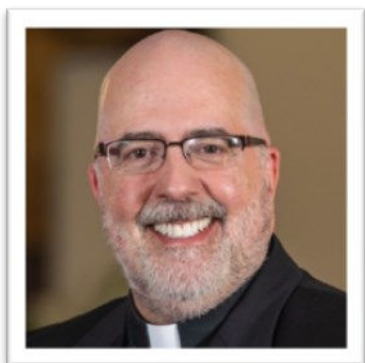

In the twentieth century, most of us are accustomed to special seasonal foods primarily at Christmas and Thanksgiving. But in many parts of the world, for many centuries, the whole year was filled with particular foods for the feast days of the saints.

In fact, they're called Feast Days because it was expected that on those days commemorating the lives of those who have preceded us to God's Kingdom, there would be actual feasting. In cities and villages associated with a particular patron saint, local specialties would be named for that saint. Often these dishes would be served only on those saints' days and would include ingredients or shapes associated with those saints.

Of course, there are saints associated with the culinary arts. St. Honoré is the patron of pastry chefs and confectioners, although it's unclear why the sixth century French bishop is so honored. But the traditional Gâteau St. Honoré is a culinary triumph: a choux pastry crown of cream-filled profiteroles topped with caramel and candied flowers. The patron saint of cooks is St. Fortunatus, another sixth century bishop, who was also a poet and musician who penned the well-known Latin hymn Pange Lingua.

The founder of modern French cooking, Auguste Escoffier, named a dish after him: a suckling pig stuffed with chestnuts, barley, sausage, herbs, and liver. I think I'll stick with St. Honoré.

My own patron saint, St. Lawrence deacon and martyr, was martyred by being roasted on a gridiron. The patron saint of restaurateurs, he has many dishes associated with his name. I usually celebrate his August 10th feast day with a simple barbecue.
