Nicholas Copernicus may have been the greatest mind of the 16th century. He was a mathematician, a jurist, a physician, a classics scholar, a diplomat, an economist, and an astronomer -- the field in which he today is best known. He was also a Catholic priest.

It seems ironic that Copernicus is remembered today primarily as an astronomer, since it seems that his work in this field was mostly a hobby. His

chief contribution was the development of heliocentrism, the theory that the earth orbits the sun, and not the other way around. While other scholars had advanced this theory as speculation, Copernicus was the first to look at it in a systematic way back up by both astronomical observation and mathematics.

This theory, which did not place the earth at the center of the universe, and by extension not at the center of creation, was initially welcomed by scholars, and even by the church. In fact, his book The Revolution of the Spheres in the Heavens was dedicated to Pope Paul the Third. It was not until nearly 60 years after Copernicus published his work that the Catholic Church took any official action against it. It was in the context of the church's condemnation of Galileo that Copernicus' theories were denounced for being contrary to sacred Scripture.

Today, of course, both Galileo and Copernicus have been entirely vindicated. Because the church has long since moved away from a literal interpretation of Scripture, the idea that the earth is not the center of the universe isn't at all threatening. Instead, we've come to a deeper appreciation of the work of scientists like Galileo and Nicholas Copernicus, whose use of reason, observation, mathematics and logic have drawn us deeper into the mystery of God's creation.
