

Hidden Figures

"Hidden in plain sight" and "out of sight, out of mind" were two of the variations on this week's theme that the Holy Spirit placed on my heart. And "Hidden Figures" seems to best apprehend the felt-sense I have: the essence of which is "do I look for Christ already present in each and every person that I encounter?" Each and every person.

Even and perhaps especially persons I judge to be different than I am.

Different on account of their socio-economic situation, race, ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation, social location, relationship with religion, etc., etc., etc.

Can I find Christ already present in them too? And if I see <u>that</u> Christ being oppressed, being persecuted, being marginalized, am I courageous enough to become an *upstander* rather than a bystander? And oh how squarely in my heart the words of Israeli historian and Shoah scholar Yehuda Bauer and Holocaust survivor Elie Weisel hit:

"Thou shalt not be a victim, thou shalt not be a perpetrator, but, above all, thou shalt not be a bystander." "Neutrality helps the oppressor, never the victim," Weisel said. "We must always take sides... Silence encourages the tormentor."

Dear Jesus, we ask for the grace to look more closely for you moment by moment- and once recognized, that we have courage to follow in your footsteps, and do what is right and just. Amen.
