



In this week's Mass readings, themes of God's dedication and fatherly care are prevalent. It's amazing to read how in 2nd Kings, in the times of the prophet Elisha and Kings, a parallel to Jesus' feeding of the five thousand is mentioned. A prophet in the times of corruption in Israel and Judah where many of the Kings did what was evil in the sight of the Lord, Elisha reminds his servant of how with God, twenty loaves of barley would be sufficient for a crowd of one hundred. God had made this promise; He would undoubtedly follow through and answer the people's needs. The fulfillment of the scriptures, Christ Jesus himself, again turned to God the Father in performing his miracle of the five thousand; "Then Jesus took the loaves, gave thanks, and distributed them to those who were reclining, and also as much of the fish as they wanted" (Jn 6: 11). Further, at the end of this Gospel portion in verse 14, Jesus is referred to as the "Prophet, the one who is to come into the world." I feel that these readings go hand in hand in terms of physical nourishment, but also spiritual. In times when the people hundreds of years before the coming of Christ were doubtful and even worshipped other gods, God's loyalty remained, and he eventually sent His Son to bring new life to the world. This same God was working through Jesus and is here with us today; He truly is all that we could ever need! The Newman club continues to meet regularly for rosary nights, small group, and summer-themed events at the C+CC. Don't hesitate to reach out with questions!

From Fr. Larry:

After 16 months of COVID-19 pandemic lockdowns, restrictions, struggles, and tragedy, we are at long last seeing some light at the end of this very long tunnel. To be sure, we're not at the end of this, and in fact no one really knows what the "end" of this pandemic will look like. As much as we'd love to be able to put a stake in the ground and say, "we're done with this!" that seems very unlikely. Instead, we'll probably see additional waves of illness among unvaccinated people, some limited infection even among the vaccinated, and— unless more of us are vaccinated— the evolution of more unpredictable variant strains of the virus.

And yet.... we are still making progress, and are returning to a somewhat more normal life. As a community of faith, Christ Sun of Justice parish is starting to revive. More people are returning to inperson worship (Nice to meet you!!). We're singing again. And we're able to feel a little more normal when we gather for worship. Of course, not everyone is feeling that. Some people still need or prefer to stay masked in public spaces. And for our kids who thus far cannot be vaccinated, masks are still required. This is a significant additional burden for some of our families, and one that I don't know how to accommodate easily. It's hard enough for our youngest kids to sit through Mass; staying masked is really difficult for them. I'm open to suggestions about making it easier for kids and parents.

On so many levels, this pandemic experience is a big reset. We've been forced to examine how we've structured our lives, and how we might want to live differently. Home, work, school, family, and church will all look a little different in the coming months. It's hard to anticipate what that restructuring will bring, but I'm hopeful that with the guidance of the Holy Spirit, we can chart a new course together, faithful to the mission that has been entrusted to us.
